

Will my college credits transfer?

Absolutely. Well...yes. Actually...let's talk.

ALL of the dual credit classes offered at Wellington High School are accredited through either Cowley County Community College or Southwestern College. This means that they are legitimate college courses and will transfer. Will they transfer as what you need? That's a whole different question.

This document will explain how to research the required credits for specific college majors and align the dual credit classes offered at WHS with future goals.

Step 1:

Know what WHS has to offer

At WHS we currently offer the following courses:

Step 2:

Know where you're going

It can be tricky trying to anticipate what college you will be attending in the future, but it is important to have a generalized idea. Are you going out of state, attending a state Regent college/university, or attending a private college/university? By narrowing down your selections, you can maximize your time on each of the school's web pages.

Step 3:

Know your prospective major

Again, we know that things can change, but have an idea of the field in which you want to major. Research each program's "plan of study." A "plan of study" will show the requirements for a degree in that major. It might also be called a "program of study" or a "class sequence chart." These can typically be found on each college's "Majors and Programs" page.

Step 4:

Know how to look-up credit transfer equivalency

Most colleges and universities have a credit transfer equivalency page. On the page, you can enter your Cowley or Southwestern course codes to see how your credits earned in high school will transfer to your future school. Compare the classes to what is required in your major based on the information obtained from the "program of study." For the most current information, speak with a college/university advisor or use their credit transfer page below.
